able to grow through leadership lessons of selfdiscipline, hard work, teamwork and goal completion.


Our Mission




Project-Based Academics

Our goal is to provide cadets with the best possible learning environment while supporting them as they achieve their goals. Academic classes will be project-based, emphasizing hands-on learning. Cadets will have the option of enrolling in a new class, repeating a class or choosing from a number of electives. Structured study hours are provided in the evenings. A Homework Assistance Program for cadets in need of additional academic support will be available for a nominal fee.

Spiritual Development

All cadets will attend chapel services on weekday mornings. This fellowship time will serve to build community and to identify, promote and encourage the qualities that lead to personal success. This community gathering will also provide opportunities for public speaking and recognizing cadets' achievements.



Leadership

The Summer OPS program provides cadets with the same successful military leadership training that is offered during the regular school year at St. John's Northwestern. Daily military training instills structure, discipline and develops personal leadership skills. Upon successful completion of the summer academic program, a cadet will earn rank that he will retain should he decide to attend St. John's Northwestern's regular academic program in the fall.

Wellness & Sports

Cadets will attend physical training, sports or a physical activity each weekday afternoon as scheduled. Each activity will be staffed by an experienced and trained employee who will supervise and lead the scheduled event. It is the intent of this program to ensure that each cadet develops an appreciation for wellness, physical training and competitive sports in an organized, balanced and safe environment.

Weekend Activities

Weekends will include structured activities and outings such as:

International Cadets

The English as a Second Language (ESL) program combines two outstanding facets of the Academy's commitment to excellence: it provides the opportunity for international cadets to receive instruction in the English language; and the opportunity to experience the full program at St. John's Northwestern. ESL cadets will not only receive 40 hours of classroom English instruction, but will be immersed with native English speaking cadets in other classes and activities. ESL cadets will also receive preparation for the ACT and TOEFL.

Additional Electives & Fees

Canadian Field Study Experience

SJNMA has partnered with Totem Lodge, a world-class fishing resort in Ontario, Canada, to offer cadets enrolled in the biology course an opportunity to begin their class there.

Cadets participating in this field study will spend four nights and three days at Totem Lodge. During this time, they will spend half the day conducting biology fieldwork under the direction of an SINMA science instructor and the other half learning how to fish with a professional fishing guide. It's a great blend of academic application and enjoying the great outdoors!

Cost: \$1,075 Passports are required

Note: This is optional within the biology course. Class credit is not affected if a cadet does not participate in the field study.



Drivers Education

This course will include classroom instruction for cadets to pass the Wisconsin Instruction Permit and the required 30 hours of Behind-the-Wheel instruction.

Classroom Instruction

A certified instructor from Lancer Driving School will teach the 30-hour classroom instruction. Cadets will have the opportunity to take the written examination.

Behind-the-Wheel

Cadets will receive 12 hours of in-car training. Upon successful completion of this class, cadets will earn their instructional driving permit and gain initial driving experience with a certified instructor.

Cost: \$500 Includes instruction, registrations and testing fees; Age limit is 151/2

Aviation Ground School

The Private Pilot ground school class is taught at a local airport by a licensed flight instructor from Spring City Aviation. The purpose of the class is to provide cadets with the knowledge to study and pass the required Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) written examination. The course covers topics such as aerodynamic principles, airplane systems and performance, airport and airspace operations, aviation weather, and navigation. As part of the program, cadets will take a "Discovery Flight" with a flight instructor.

Cadets who wish to pursue their private pilot certificate may do so by enrolling in the Aviation Science Program, a science elective offered during the regular school year at St. John's Northwestern, Please call for additional information.

Cost: \$625 Age limit is 16 and older

SCUBA

Cadets will earn their Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI) through Open Water and Advanced Open Water Certifications. They will participate in activities such as night diving, boat diving, underwater navigation, deep diving and set-up wreck diving.

Cost: \$650 Includes fees, supplies and equipment rental; Age limit is 14 and older

JROTC

The focus of the Army Junior ROTC program is reflected in its mission: "To Motivate Young People to be Better Citizens." Cadets will experience a nationally accredited, award-winning curriculum based on experimental learning. Mornings are designated for classroom lecture and discussion.
